RECENT EVENTS

Last EDAS Lecture

At our last EDAS lecture Dr Jenny Chambers of the National Ice Age Network (NIAN) spoke to us on "<u>The Big Chill? Environments and Inhabitants of England during the Ice Age</u>." This was a very interesting overview of "things that you should know" about this very ancient archaeology. Jenny told us that the length of the latest Ice Age is now estimated to be at least 100,000 years, lasting until about 10,000 years ago, although there were warmer periods during this time. In Britain the peri-glacial region reached down to East Anglia and then Somerset on two of its advances. (forming Martin Green's Nailids).

Unsurprisingly, archaeological finds from this period are very few, and not many types of relic survive. Bone and tool related artefacts can survive, and the best hunting grounds are the now buried alluvial gravel beds that seemed to be suitable for prehistoric occupation. This means that the NIAN's work is funded by the same Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund that supports Rebecca Causer in her work for the Hampshire & Wight Trust for Maritime Archaeology (our recent December lecturer). However, what Jenny's talk, and our visit to Boxgrove on a previous EDAS Field Trip, made clear, is that, with the right specialist knowledge and experience, understanding the archaeology of the very distant past is not quite as impossible as we might have thought. Also, scientific methods are improving all the time, and it is now possible to know what the climate was at different times, as well as being able to date very old artefacts better.

We thank Jenny for a very interesting and thought provoking talk, and look forward to what the improving archaeology of these periods will reveal to us in the future.

CBA Wessex Study Days: 2007 Andy Manning

CBA Wessex, in partnership with Wessex Archaeology, is offering a series of study days, which give members an excellent hands-on experience of different aspects of archaeology, guided by leading experts.

In January, Bob Hill introduced us to the mysteries of historic building recording, including the ever changing techniques used in their construction. Case-studies showed that even apparently mundane buildings can provide surprising clues to the past. The day ended with a fascinating guided tour of the historic buildings within the Close and Salisbury town centre. Starting at the Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum, one of the earliest of Salisbury's buildings, the tour even included that jewel of the 1960s, *Woolworths*.

In March, the study group embarked on a very different journey, looking at the basics of environmental archaeology with Dr Mike Allen. After learning how environmental archaeology can provide vital insights into the past, there was a guided tour of the Wessex Archaeology labs. Finally, the group got the chance to get muddy and undertook their own research with some environmental augering at a nearby field.
